#### CLASSIC FM'S ALL BRITISH BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION

Wednesday 21st April, 6am to 10pm

It's Classic FM's All British Birthday Celebration to mark the day Her Majesty The Queen turns 95. So, expect to hear nothing but the finest British classical music all day.

Tim Lihoreau starts things off in style on Classic FM's More Music Breakfast with the music of Sir Karl Jenkins, Vaughan Williams, Doreen Carwithen and Peter Maxwell Davies. From 9am, Alexander Armstrong continues the celebration with recordings from orchestras of which The Queen is patron. After Anne-Marie Minhall from 12pm and a very special Classic FM Requests (12pm to 2pm), John Brunning takes up the baton from 4pm with British music that spans the centuries. There are pieces from Thomas Tallis, who served as composer for King Henry VIII; the talented 19<sup>th</sup> century composer, Samuel Coleridge-Taylor; and the prominent contemporary composer, Nigel Hess.

At 8pm, The Classic FM Concert with John Suchet completes the birthday celebration. There's music by composers who have held the position of Master of the King's Musick, now Master of the Queen's Music, including Boyce, Elgar and now Weir. The highlight of the programme is the first broadcast in full of a captivating new work by Classic FM's Composer in Residence, Debbie Wiseman. *The Music of Kings and Queens*.

#### SATURDAY 17TH APRIL

#### 4pm to 7pm: MOIRA STUART'S HALL OF FAME CONCERT

Moira showcases some of the pieces that were best-in-show in the 2021 Classic FM Hall of Fame. The programme begins with Mozart's overture to *The Magic Flute*, before Leif Ove Andsnes is the soloist in Rachmaninov's Piano Concerto No.2 and Itzhak Perlman plays John Williams' iconic theme to *Schindler's List*.

There's also a suite of music from Tchaikovsky's *Swan Lake*, heard in a 2020 recording from the Philharmonia Orchestra, and a work by Vivaldi that climbed 145 places in this year's chart.

#### 7pm to 9pm: SATURDAY NIGHT AT THE MOVIES with ANDREW COLLINS

Andrew digs out music from some favourite films, including *The Dark Knight* scored by Hans Zimmer; a classic from *Frozen* that almost didn't make the film's final cut; Klaus Badelt's swashbuckling music for *Pirates of the Caribbean: The Curse of the Black Pearl* and the current number one in the Classic FM Movie Music Hall of Fame – *Schindler's List* – composed by John Williams.

#### 9pm to 10pm: DAVID MELLOR'S MELODIES

David showcases some of the best melodies used in opera entractes, preludes and overtures. He includes one of the most recognisable intermezzo's, from Mascagni's *Cavalleria Rusticana* before the moving prelude to Verdi's opera *La Traviata*. Wagner also makes an appearance with extracts from *Parsifal*.

#### SUNDAY 18TH APRIL

### 4pm to 7pm: JOHN HUMPHRYS

John plays music by Schubert aged just 19; a light, bright work that may well have been the piece that convinced him to break off from studying law and make music his life. We hear from The Academy of St Martin in the Fields under Neville Marriner, who perform the second movement of Schubert's Symphony No.5.

There's a recording from a young boy treble who crowd-funded his first album and found recent fame singing the title music to TV's *The Pembrokeshire Murders*. John features a track from Cai Thomas's debut album *Seren*.

#### 7pm to 9pm: SMOOTH CLASSICS AT SEVEN with CHARLOTTE HAWKINS

Charlotte features the pianist Elizabeth Joy Roe as her Young Classical Star. Hailed as 'brilliant' by the New York Times, the young musician from Chicago studied at the Juilliard School and has gone on to perform at Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Centre, the Kennedy Centre and the Seoul Arts Centre. She has also received praise for her solo albums, most recent of which is a recording of the complete John Field *Nocturnes*.

#### 9pm to 10pm: MUSIC FOR MONARCHY with DEBBIE WISEMAN (2 / 4)

Classic FM's Composer in Residence, Debbie Wiseman, continues her exploration of the musical world of Kings and Queens, and the musical passions of British monarchs.

Debbie discovers how Handel's *Music for the Royal Fireworks* did not debut as planned thanks to inclement weather, technical hiccups and eighteenth century traffic jams. She also explains why a fight broke out between two singers during a royal performance of a Handel work. Handel retained their services, evidently concluding that there was no such thing as bad publicity.

Debbie also reveals how the patronage of King George III created The Royal Society of Musicians of Great Britain, and plays *March for the Royal Society of Musicians*, written by Haydn for a society fundraiser. Finally, Dame Helen Mirren introduces a new work of Debbie's that pays tribute to our current monarch, Queen Elizabeth II.

## 8pm to 10pm: THE CLASSIC FM CONCERT with JOHN SUCHET: MONDAY MOODLIFTERS

To start the week in a positive way, John presents a programme of some of the most uplifting music. To begin, the overture to *The Merry Widow,* which originally did not exist as part of the comic opera, but Lehár wrote to celebrate the 400<sup>th</sup> performance.

Lars Vogt plays all the right notes in the right order, in Grieg's Piano Concerto, before Schubert's Symphony No.3, which was written not long after the composer's 18<sup>th</sup> birthday, but never published during his lifetime. John selects a recent recording from the Munich Symphony Orchestra conducted by Kevin John Edusei.

# 8pm to 10pm: THE CLASSIC FM CONCERT with JOHN SUCHET: KEEPING IT IN THE FAMILY

It's a family affair, as John celebrates those composers who have had some of the spotlight stolen by their more famous relatives. Opening the programme is music by Josef Strauss, whom, aside from being a talented musician, was also a skilled engineer and invented a precursor to the modern-day street sweeper, but is often overshadowed by the Johanns in his family.

There is a piano concerto by Franz Xavier Mozart, Wolfgang's youngest child, who spent much of his life compared to his famous father, and Eva Oertle and Consuelo Giulianelli play Fanny Mendelssohn's beautiful *Schwanenlied*. To end the programme, there's a performance of Saint-Saëns *Carnival of the Animals* from the 21<sup>st</sup> century's most celebrated musical family: the Kanneh-Masons.

#### 9am to 12pm: ALEXANDER ARMSTRONG

Alexander continues Classic FM's All British Birthday Celebration with music in **The Classic FM Hall of Fame Hour** including Elgar's *Pomp & Circumstance March No.1*, Walton's *Crown Imperial* and 'Myrtle' from *The Glorious Garden* by Debbie Wiseman. Later in the morning, Alexander features recordings from three orchestras of which The Queen is patron – the Royal Scottish National Orchestra, the London Symphony Orchestra and the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra.

#### 12pm to 4pm: ANNE-MARIE MINHALL

Including **Classic FM Requests** 12pm-2pm – a chance for listeners to phone in over the course of the programme and request their favourite piece of British music. After Classic FM Requests, Anne-Marie presents the **Hall of Fame 3 at 3** – three pieces of music by British composers from the Classic FM Hall of Fame chart.

#### 4pm to 7pm: CLASSIC FM DRIVE with JOHN BRUNNING

John continues Classic FM's All British Birthday Celebration with British music that spans the centuries. ## 8pm to 10pm: THE CLASSIC FM CONCERT with JOHN SUCHET: A ROYAL BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION

John celebrates a very special birthday, as Her Majesty The Queen turns 95 today. There's music by composers who have held the position of Master of the King's Musick, now Master of the Queen's Music, including Boyce, Elgar and now Weir. There's a moment to reflect Her Majesty's new established award, The Queen's Music Medal, which is presented to an "outstanding individual or group of musicians who have had a major influence on the musical life of the nation", via a stunning performance of Vivaldi's Violin Concerto in D major from the 2016 recipient: Nicola Benedetti.

The highlight of the programme is the first broadcast in full of a captivating new work by Classic FM's Composer in Residence, Debbie Wiseman. *The Music of Kings and Queens* tells the story of the making of the United Kingdom via 12 of the most significant monarchs, from William the Conqueror to Queen Elizabeth II. Dame Helen Mirren and Damian Lewis introduce each musical depiction.

## 8pm to 10pm: THE CLASSIC FM CONCERT with JOHN SUCHET: ST GEORGE'S DAY
